THE NAMING COMMISSION FINAL REPORT TO CONGRESS

PART I: United States Army Bases

- **Fort Benning, Ga.** – recommended to be renamed Fort Moore, for Lt. Gen. Hal Moore and his wife, Julia. Hal Moore received the Distinguished Service Cross for heroism in the Vietnam War. Julia Moore was an advocate for military families; she changed how the military notifies family members of casualties to deliver the news in a more compassionate way.
- **Fort Bragg, N.C.** – recommended to be renamed Fort Liberty, after the value of liberty, a founding principle of the nation, and the 82nd Airborne Division’s song that goes “We’re all-American [and] proud to be, for we are the soldiers of liberty.”
- **Fort A.P. Hill, Va.** – recommended to be renamed Fort Walker, after Dr. Mary Walker, the Army’s first female surgeon. She volunteered as a civilian to be a doctor for troops during the Civil War because she was not allowed to join the military as a woman.
- **Fort Hood, Tx.** – recommended to be renamed Fort Cavazos, after Gen. Richard Cavazos, a Texan who received the Distinguished Service Cross during the Korean War and later a second Distinguished Service Cross for heroism in the Vietnam War. He is recognized for his innovative leadership of III Corps. In 1982, Cavazos again made military history by being appointed the army's first Hispanic four-star general and the same year assumed command of FORSCOM. His early support for the National Training Center and his involvement in the development of the Battle Command Training Program enormously influenced the war fighting capabilities of the United States Army.
- **Fort Lee, Va.** – recommended to be renamed Fort Gregg-Adams, after two Army logisticians - Lt. Gen. Arthur Gregg and Lt. Col. Charity Adams. Arthur Gregg enlisted to work on supply logistics in Germany during World War II, applied to officer candidate school when the military was desegregated, and retired as a lieutenant general. He was a key figure in the integration of black soldiers into the Army. Lt. Col. Charity Adams joined the military after the attack on Pearl Harbor and led a postal battalion in Europe during the war. She was one of the highest-ranking female soldiers in World War II.
- **Fort Gordon, Ga.** – recommended to be renamed Fort Eisenhower, after President Dwight Eisenhower, who also served as supreme commander of the allied expeditionary force in Europe during World War II before becoming president.
- **Fort Pickett, Va.** – recommended to be renamed Fort Barfoot, after Tech. Sgt. (at time of incident) Van T. Barfoot, a Medal of Honor recipient. Barfoot completed the war as a 2nd Lt.
- **Fort Polk, La.** – recommended to be renamed Fort Johnson, after Sgt. William Henry Johnson, who received the Medal of Honor for fighting Germans first with grenades, then with bullets, then with the butt of his rifle before resorting to a knife during World War I.
- **Fort Rucker, Ala.** – recommended to be renamed Fort Novosel after Chief Warrant Officer 4 Michael J. Novosel Sr., who earned the Medal of Honor during Vietnam for flying an aircraft through enemy fire to save 29 men.
- **Fort Belvoir, Va.** – not yet determined if name will be changed.

FORT GREGG-ADAMS



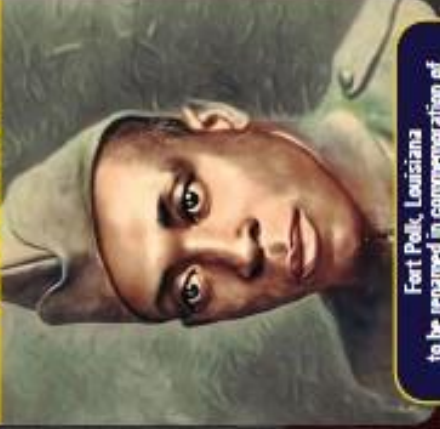
Fort Lee, Virginia to be renamed in commemoration of LIG Arthur J. Gregg and LTC Charity Adams

FORT BARFOOT



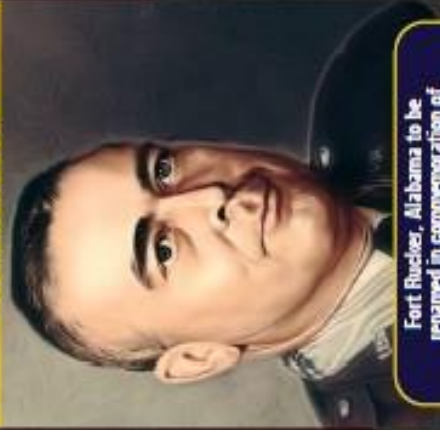
Fort Pickett, Virginia to be renamed in commemoration of T/SGT Van T. Barfoot
